Also last year at this time, we were just coming out of a winter cold snap that showed the frailties of solar and wind energy, but that is another topic in its own right.

I am not sure if you will get this before the 2022 Annual Membership Meeting, regardless, I hope you are able to attend. It has been such a long time since we have been able to get together. We look forward to seeing you! As you have seen, we will have Wyoming Health Fairs there for the regular blood draw. With the larger space in the new event center, we will have additional displays and more room to move around. Hope to see you there!

On the less fun side of things, we continue to deal with the issues from the folks in Colorado. With the Colorado PUC we have reached a tentative agreement on how to move forward actually looking at compliance with the Colorado requirements. We have been asked many times how Colorado regulations impact Wyoming. This is a valid question. This can impact



us in a few different ways. One way it impacts us is that as Colorado decides they don't want their electricity coming from fossil fuels, it reduces the production needed from Wyoming generation plants. Since Wyoming is a significant exporter of electricity, this means less sales from our plants, therefore less money coming into Wyoming.

Staying on the financial side of things, since they don't want electrons from fossil fuel plants, they need to replace the fossil fuel plants with something else. Some think that wind and solar is a replacement for fossil fuel, however it does not run all the time, so something that is available all the time is necessary. Some think that the answer to this is large batteries, however batteries are very expensive, and the current technology does not provide more than a few hours of energy. Thinking back to last February, a few hours of power from batteries would not have provided nearly enough power to ride out the cold weather event. Building anything new is expensive, especially when you have remaining life in existing plants. I will not get into the idea of subsidies that are provided because these subsidies come from somewhere, eventually, they come from the pockets of consumers.

The other way these regulations impact us is in terms of reliability. The electrical grid is a huge system and any changes impact everyone connected. As the large fossil fuel machines are taken offline, the grid does not have the "inertia" to remain stable. Therefore, as the overall grid is weakened, if something happens in New Mexico, it can affect us in Wyoming. This "something" could be anything from a storm to an equipment failure. Just look at last February. That "something" was the lack of a storm. There was no wind, so there was no wind energy. We absolutely need these reliable plants online to maintain reliability. This has been what the Wyoming Tri-State members have been pounding home as we talk with others about Tri-State's resource plan, Reliability and Affordability. We all need electricity to heat our homes, run our motors, and keep the lights on, not just when the weather is favorable. Some day there may be alternatives, but right now, we have to be careful and not compromise the reliability we have.

The Wyoming Tri-State members are having an impact in Colorado. One of the parties involved in the resource plan discussions said, in their view, the Wyoming members' participation drove the settlement to a much better place than it would have been otherwise. It is words like this that keep us in the fight! Fighting to do what is best for you, our member-owners!



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
